

# Our reach 🔑 🧼

At CRY, we aim to reach the last child in the hope of enabling brighter futures for children everywhere. In 2020-21, we partnered with 99 grassroots projects across 19 states in India to positively impact the lives of India's children.





# COVID response & way forward

The COVID-19 pandemic is one of the biggest humanitarian crises that the world has ever seen and India's underprivileged communities and their children have been one of the worst hit.

As a response, we created an agile plan to ensure that India's most vulnerable families stay protected. This plan focused on:

#### Prevention

- Providing PPE kits, pulse oximeters, thermal scanners, BP monitors and medicines to all frontline healthcare workers.
- Distributing urgent medical equipment like oxygen refill cylinders, oxygen concentrators, thermal scanners and pulse oximeters to public health centres as well as project teams.

#### Nutrition

• Providing dry ration kits that include cereal, pulses, spices, oil, sugar, salt, potatoes and soy chunks to ensure basic nutrition for children and their families.

#### Health & hygiene

• Distributing sanitary pads and soaps to enable adolescent girls to manage their health and menstrual hygiene for 3 months.

#### **Education**

• Distributing education materials and workbooks along with organising digital classes to ensure that children are able to continue learning while schools were closed.

#### Pandemic preparedness & management:

- Sensitising the communities about COVID-19 safety precautions by busting myths associated with infections, tests and vaccinations.
- Raising awareness on the available supply of vital medicines and oxygen.

#### Your support helped provide over 4 lakh children and their families across 19 states during this critical time.

However the pandemic continues to rage and to ensure that this doesn't become a child rights crisis in the long term, we've been working on a resilience and recovery plan for underprivileged children that covers:

#### **Health & nutrition:**

Given the loss of livelihoods and the closure of government mechanisms like primary healthcare centres/school midday meal scheme, children's health has been severely affected. They're unable to get proper nutrition, timely immunisation or proper healthcare and thus, we are focusing on:

- Ensuring ongoing vaccinations to avoid susceptibility to other deadly diseases
- Providing timely care to lactating and pregnant mothers
- Addressing malnutrition to reduce infant/child mortality
- Ensuring awareness around menstrual hygiene

#### **Safety & protection:**

There has been a significant rise in the cases of child labour, child marriage and trafficking in the first wave of COVID. Given the severity of the second wave, this number is at the risk of rising exponentially. To ensure children stay protected from abuse and exploitation, we are focusing on:

- Identifying and handling cases of children being forced into child labour or pushed to become child brides to reduce the financial pressure on the family
- Strengthening child protection mechanisms at the village as well as district levels
- Raising awareness on the negative impact of child labour and child marriage on children's future

#### **Education:**

The closure of schools for over a year and the severe lack of digital access has led to a gap in children's education. To ensure this situation doesn't become a permanent one, we are focusing on:

- Providing worksheets, guides and digital support to help children continue studying
- Conducting community based study sessions for children in small groups using online mediums like WhatsApp

We've already begun addressing the long-term repercussions on children in the aftermath of the Coronavirus outbreak, but we need your continued support to ensure that no child is left behind.

In the words of one of our children from a CRY project in Mumbai, "I have faith in myself and in the world that we'll get through this".





# Bend it like Gujjar 🦫 🧩



"I want to become like Ronaldo and Messi and I also aspire to be an IPS officer!"

When Sapna Gujjar, a young girl from a CRY project in Ajmer, Rajasthan said this, her community could never have imagined that one day, she would make it happen. Where she comes from, the idea of girls playing football outside the home, or even going out for school or work, is almost inconceivable. In fact, most girls are married off as child brides as soon as possible to uphold the family's honour.

It was against this backdrop that Sapna, with CRY's support, formed a small girls' football team. Inspired by her experience at the CRY children's collective, she decided

to take charge of her future. Initially, there was intense opposition from all corners of her village. People tried to physically stop them from playing and practicing but CRY worked to change the mindset of the community and the girls were determined to pave their own path.

The girls football team persevered through all challenges and at the 'Sports For Change' competition organised by HCL Foundation, Sapna led her team to victory! A victory that opened her community's eyes to what girls are truly capable of.

Today, the village not only endeavours to send all girls to school but the football team also actively campaigns against child marriage with the community's full support. Those who were once completely against the idea of girls playing football are now sponsoring them and many of the girls have gone on to win scholarships.

Sapna herself recently topped the higher secondary board exams with a whopping score of 93% and is on the path to making her dream of becoming an IPS officer come true!




## Our multiplier model 🦫 🚜

## The power of the collective 🔑 🙏





When the going gets tough, the tough get going indeed!

Khajuraho is one of the most visited tourist places in India and when the news about the pandemic came to light, CRY's adolescent girls group immediately jumped into action.

Seema\* knew that buying face masks, that were being sold in the market for Rs. 30-40, will not be affordable by all. She, along with other members of the group, took it upon themselves to find a solution and started discussing various prevention methods including hand-washing with soaps, using homemade masks and observing social distancing.

They went door-to-door to educate the community about these prevention methods, and to address the need for masks, collected unstitched good quality cotton cloth pieces.

Having divided themselves into four groups as per availability of sewing machines and social distancing protocols, these girls stitched around 750 masks in no time and distributed them within the community free of cost!

We're SO proud of our girls for demonstrating presence of mind, standing up for their community and setting an excellent example for the rest of us!

## How volunteering changed Ishita's life!



My childhood was a happy one; in no way did I have to face adversity, and my family supported me in everything I did. I had only read about social inequalities in textbooks, only learned about it from afar, but once I was exposed to the realities of inequality, I knew I had to give back to this community. That's how I started my journey as a volunteer. My aim was to use my privilege and resources to make their lives better.

Volunteering initially took a toll on me; it was heartbreaking. I looked at the children and the lives of deprivation they had been living. This made me angry, but it also made my resolve stronger.

During volunteering, every day was a novel experience. Looking at the faces of the children every time I entered the classroom filled me with hope and warmth. Interacting with them, teaching them, and seeing their eagerness and potential filled me with so much joy and pride. My favourite volunteer experience was helping a 15-year-old student through her exams. I taught her all the subjects, and she passed with flying colours! During the COVID-19 outbreak, I joined other volunteers to do crowdfunding for the first time. I raised Rs. 71,000, and I felt like I made a contribution that really mattered!

# The walk of determination 🦫 🚜





Parvati Bai is not just a hero for us but also for the families in the remote tribal district of Jalna in Maharashtra.

Even before the lockdown, people like Parvati Bai – a community organiser from one of our projects in the district- were completely cut off from civilisation due to lack of transportation facilities and infrastructure.

But that didn't stop her then and it sure didn't stop her now – when she knew the community needed all the help it could get. She took the responsibility of ensuring that no underprivileged family was left behind during the distribution of COVID relief measures like dry rations and hygiene supplies.

With no way of transporting relief materials, she actually walked 5 kms on foot carrying all the relief material on her head so that children and their families residing in the interior areas could be taken care of and given what they critically needed to survive.

We're floored by her resilience and salute her courage!
