Background on the impact of volunteering survey 2024 – 2025

CRY India's vast work is powered by volunteers who are the heart of the organization. They tirelessly support and advocate for vulnerable children, building meaningful relationships as friends, mentors, and confidants. But what is the true worth of volunteering? Is it about better grades or holistic development to thrive in today's VUCA world? Limiting its value to the impact on children alone is narrow. Its true worth lies in the growth it fosters in both children and volunteers.

Since fiscal year 2018-19, an annual exercise has been conducted to assess the impact of volunteering on volunteers. Its purpose is:

- Determine the impact volunteering has on the volunteers.
- Participate in further debate and thought on what can be done to ensure their well-being and increase the impact they make.

For the seventh year, a survey assessed volunteer impact across five engagements: Direct Work with Children, Internship, Online Research/Data Analysis/Content Support, Campaign and Events, Special Projects (Institutional Collaboration), Sprint/Daan Utsav/Online Short Term, and YCC.

In order to assess the impact of volunteering, the following development criteria & factors along with a 5-point scale were chosen:

Demographic profile of volunteers surveyed

A total of 538 responses were received and analyzed for this report

GENDER



Nearly *two-thirds* of CRY-India volunteers are female (63.75%).

LOCATION



73.42% of volunteers are from *5 metro cities*: Kolkata, Delhi NCR, Bengaluru, Mumbai, Hyderabad.

EDUCATION



95.17% hold or are pursuing a *Bachelor's or Master's* degree.

OCCUPATION



71.56% of volunteers are *students*, while 18.22% are employees.

MARRIAGE



93.68% of volunteers are *unmarried*.

AGE DISTRIBUTION



Most volunteers are *young*: 69.89% are 18–24 years old.

VOLUNTEERING DURATION & TENURE



Majority volunteer *under 5* hours/week; 68.77% engaged for less than a year.

VOLUNTEERING EXPERIENCE



Most CRY-India volunteers (77.88%) are *first-time volunteers*.

VOLUNTEERING ENGAGEMENT



Direct work with children is the top volunteering choice (40.71%).

Impact of Volunteering on Self Development Factors

- ➤ The impact of volunteering was measured across <u>five distinct self-development</u> factors:
 - Self-Esteem / Self-Confidence
 - Contentment and Satisfaction with One's Life
 - Awareness of Making a Meaningful Contribution
 - Having Things to Look Forward to in Life
 - Mental Well-being



Awareness of Making a Meaningful Contribution showed the highest improvement (90.15%), while Mental Well-being had the lowest but still significant rise (79.37%).



Across all five factors, over 79% of volunteers reported improvement: Self-esteem (84.94%), Life Satisfaction (86.62%), Awareness of Contribution (90.15%), Looking Forward to Life (86.99%), & Mental Well-being (79.37%).



Minimal Negative Impact: For each factor, <20% of volunteers reported 'no change' & <5% reported 'decrease'

Internships: Interns showed development of over 75% improvement across all factors, over 80% in four, & 78.31% in Mental Well-being. Campaigns and Events: Volunteers in this category experienced nominal increase, with over 77% across all factors Online Volunteering /

Special Projects, Sprint/Daan Utsav/Online Short-Term, and YCC – Skill improvement observed, but small sample sizes (25, 6, 1) make results insignificant.

Impact of Volunteering on Skill Development Factors

- ➤ The impact of volunteering was assessed across <u>seven different skill</u> development areas:
- Teamwork Skills
- Leadership Skills
- Learning New Skills
- Communication Skills

- Creativity Skills
- Time Management Skills
- Documentation Skills

Communication skills showed the highest improvement (89.22%), while Documentation skills had the lowest (77.14%).

Overall Positive Increase Across Skills: With the exception of Documentation, where only 77.14% reported improvement, all other six skills saw more than 82% of volunteers reporting a positive increase.

22.30% of volunteers reported no change in Documentation; for other skills, less than 20%. Skill decrease was 0.56% for Documentation and Time Management, and less than 0.40% for all other skills.

Volunteering Engagements (Type-wise Trends)









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<u>Direct Work with Children</u> – Volunteers showed huge improvement across all skills, with over 80% reporting rise in each, except Documentation (77.63%).

Internships – Over 84% interns saw improvement in all skills except for Documentation (80.72%).

Campaigns and Events – Volunteers saw substantial increases here. More than 85% noted improvement in all areas, except Creativity (83.58%) & Documentation (73.13%).

Online Volunteering – Volunteers saw relatively lower skill increases: Leadership (71.53%), Learning new skills (80.29%), Communication (84.67%), Creativity (81.02%), Teamwork (70.80%), Time Management (79.56%), Documentation (78.83%)

Impact of Volunteering on Community Development Factors

- ➤ The impact of volunteering was assessed across <u>five key community</u> <u>development factors:</u>
 - Appreciation of Others' Culture
 - Appreciation of Others' Views and Values
 - Respect for Others
 - Participation in Community Events
 - Ability to Develop Network (Networking)

The highest reported improvement was in Respect for Others, with 90.15% of volunteers noting progress. The lowest was in Networking, where 85.32% reported improvement.



All five community development factors showed positive increases: Appreciation of Culture (86.43%), Appreciation of Views & Values (87.36%), Respect for Others (90.15%), Participation in Community Events (88.66%), & Networking (85.32%).



Minimal Reports of No Change or Decrease: Across all five factors-Less than 15% of volunteers reported no change and Less than 0.75% reported any decrease

Volunteering Engagements (Type-wise Trends)









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<u>Direct Work with Children</u>: Volunteers in this category reported high levels of growth, with over 88% indicating improvement across all five

factors.

Internships: Interns also showed strong development, with over 84% reporting an increase in each factor.

Campaigns and Events: More than 89% of volunteers here saw improvements across all factors, except Appreciation for Others' Culture, which stood slightly lower at 86.57%.

Online Volunteering – Volunteers engaged in virtual roles also showed growth i.e. Improvement was above 80% for most factors. However, only 77.37% reported an increase in Networking.

Impact of Volunteering on Child Rights Awareness Factors

- ➤ The impact of volunteering was measured across <u>four key Child Rights</u> Awareness <u>Development Factors</u>:
 - Understanding the Child's Thought Process
 - Looking at the World from a Child's Perspective
 - Understanding about Child Rights Violation
 - Understanding of Policy-Level Changes that Can Ensure Child Right

Highest improvement was seen in Understanding about Child's Thought Process, with 91.08% volunteers reporting increase. The lowest was for Understanding of Policy-Level Changes, with 86.99% reporting growth.

More than 89% of volunteers reported an increase across all factors except Policy-Level Changes, which was slightly lower at 86.99%

Less than 13.00% of volunteers reported no change across all factors and Less than 0.60% reported any decline in these skills

Volunteering Engagements (Type-wise Trends)









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Direct Work with Children:

95.43% of volunteers improved in Understanding Child's Thought Process, 94.98% in Looking from Child's Perspective, 92.69% in Understanding Child Rights Violation Internships: Interns showed moderate development: Thought Process (84.34%), Child's Perspective (81.93%), and Child Rights Violation (90.36%).

Campaigns and Events: Volunteers in this category reported over 88% improvement in all four factors Special Projects, Sprint/Daan Utsav/Online Short-Term, &YCC: Skill improvement observed, but small sample sizes (25, 6, 1) make results insignificant statistically.

Online Volunteering: Volunteers in these roles showed lower improvements: Understanding Child's Thought Process (87.59%), Child's Perspective and Policy Changes (85.40%), and Child Rights Violation (84.67%).

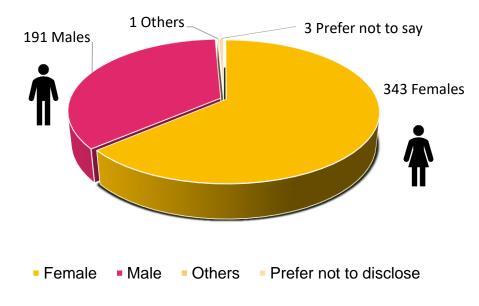
Assuming that the respondents are representative of all volunteers involved with CRY-India, the following essential details and trends emerge:

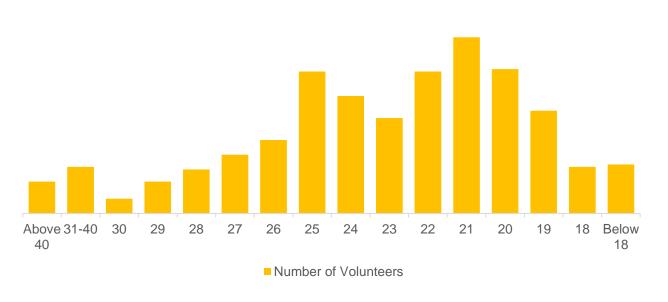
Gender-wise and age-wise classification of volunteers surveyed

Age-wise classification of volunteers surveyed

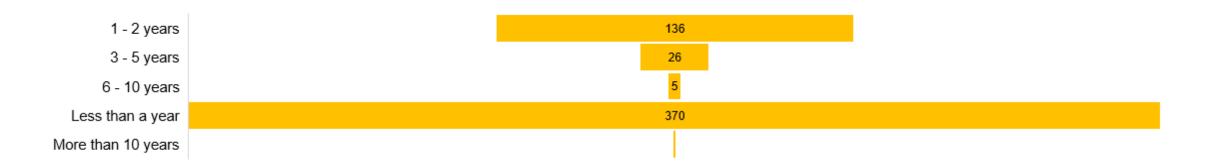

Time devoted to volunteering

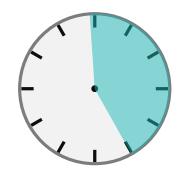
Volunteering Tenure with CRY



Hours volunteered per week by volunteers surveyed



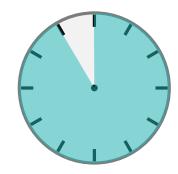

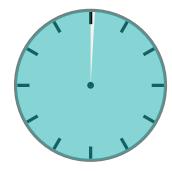

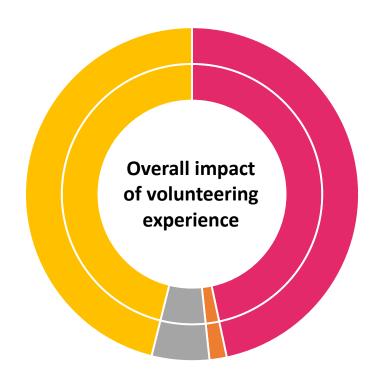

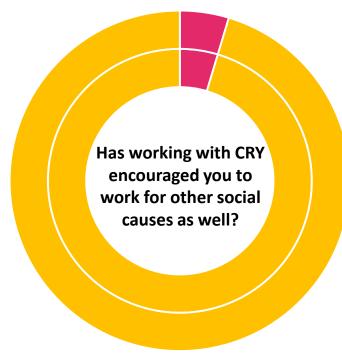

Overall impact of volunteering experience





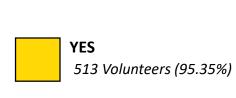

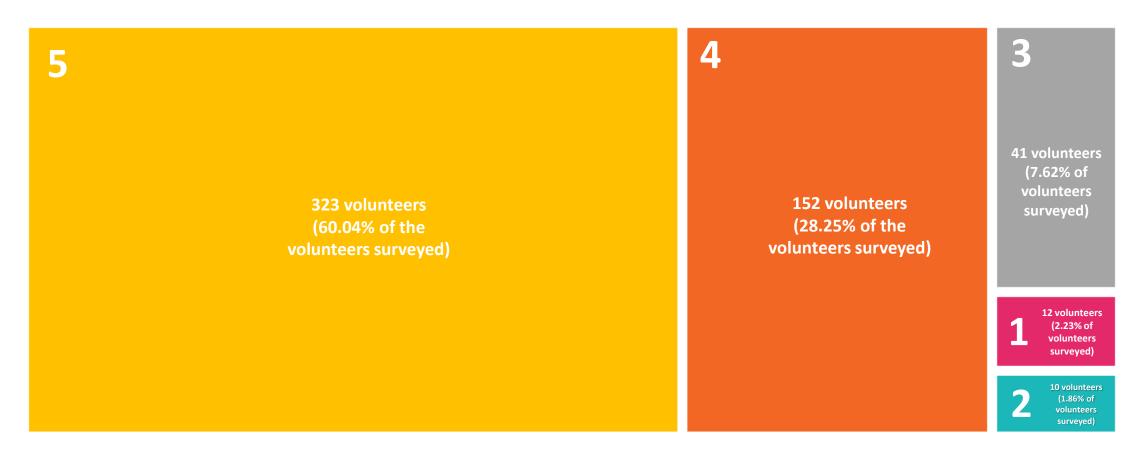

Why did you choose/ decide to volunteer with CRY?

Why did you choose/ decide to volunteer with CRY?

Yeah, I chose to work with cry because I've always been associated with children since I was a teacher and I came to know that cry is dealing with children.

So that's why basically and I just wanted to do some volunteering. So basically that's why I joined cry because to impact lives of children.

If you were not volunteering/interning (with CRY) would you have missed?

It's been great to volunteering and in fact cry was my first volunteering experience before I joined the other things and it's been like it's made me very empathetic towards the children and interacting with different types of other volunteers also.

And it's really made. It's made me very sympathetic and empathetic, gave me a lot of empathy for others here. And I came to know about the different fields in which cry is working; especially working with girl child education. I was very impressed with that.

Did any fundamental change/ shift happen to you due to volunteering with CRY?

Definitely it has made an impact on me by volunteering with cry and in fact I had never worked with Government, state government children and earlier, so it gave me a chance to Teach them and, you know, get to know about the social background. And interacting with the cry volunteers also has made a difference to me. And I was very impressed that. The youngsters, who work from 9:00 to 5:00 jobs, they also come for volunteering on Saturdays, and all that's really good. Overall I have become more empathetic to everyone.

What has volunteering with CRY meant to you?

Yeah, I would have missed of. It's been great volunteering with cry and I wouldn't have come to know about the social conditions of the children who come to government school. And I would have missed the opportunity. Which I have now got by interacting with the other volunteers who come from different spheres who come from different spheres of life.

A special memory you associate with fondness/ happiness streaming from the CRY experience?

Yeah, When I was working with Jeevan Bheema Nagar PAG; Noor was also there with me and we wanted to conduct a medical camp in the school. So prior to that, we went around visiting the parents of the children who were staying around the school and persuaded them to come for the medical camp and lots of children came. So that I really liked it. And another thing is I came to know about the social background of the children. After like going to the houses and all. So it made a huge difference with me with dealing with them.

What is that one thing that you would say to someone to engage them with CRY as a volunteer?

I would say that volunteer with cry if you want to make a change. To bring a smile to the children.

Why did you decide to volunteer with CRY?

As a university student in Hong Kong, I wanted to do something meaningful outside of my studies.

I wanted to contribute to something impactful on a national scale. I chose CRY because I was impressed by their focus on creating lasting solutions for children's rights, not just temporary fixes.

The chance to volunteer remotely was also a big plus, as it allowed me to fit it around my busy schedule.

What has this experience meant to you?

Volunteering with CRY has been incredibly rewarding. It's given me a sense of purpose and a connection to people who share my values.

I've gained valuable skills in graphic and poster designing as well as translation, which will definitely help me in the future.

More importantly, it's opened my eyes to the challenges faced by children in vulnerable situations and made me want to do even more.

A memory that makes you smile whenever you think of CRY?

I remember being deeply involved in putting together the presentation for CRY's annual report. My role was to craft the slide deck for the report.

It was such a great experience to sift through all that data and images, piecing together a narrative that truly showcased the impact CRY was having.

Seeing the final presentation, and knowing that it would be used to inform and inspire others to support the cause, filled me with a sense of purpose and pride. I felt so incredibly involved and like I was contributing directly to their continued success, even working remotely from Hong Kong.

Did volunteering change something in you—how you think, feel, act?

Definitely. I'm much more aware of global issues and inequalities than I was before. I've become more empathetic and patient, and I feel a stronger sense of responsibility to make a positive impact. I'm also more confident in speaking up about issues I care about and advocating for change. It's really broadened my perspective.

If you hadn't volunteered, what do you think you would have missed?

If I hadn't volunteered with CRY, I think I would have missed out on a valuable opportunity to learn, grow, and connect with something bigger than myself. I would have missed the chance to develop new skills, meet inspiring people, and contribute to a cause I believe in. It's helped me grow personally and professionally and has provided a focus that I may have missed.

What is that one thing that you would say to someone to engage them with CRY as volunteer?

If you're looking for a way to make a real difference in the world, I highly recommend volunteering with CRY. It's a chance to contribute your skills and passion to a cause that truly matters. Even a small amount of time can have a big impact. Why did you decide to volunteer with CRY?

My decision to volunteer with CRY was inspired by a school project focused on raising awareness about the mistreatment of domestic workers in India. Through my research, I was deeply disturbed to learn that child labor remains prevalent, despite its severe ethical implications.

I wanted to contribute to improving the situation for these children but wasn't sure where to start. That's when I discovered CRY, which provided me with the platform and guidance to channel my passion into meaningful action.

What has this experience meant to you?

Volunteering with CRY has been nothing short of transformative. As a globally recognized organization, it has equipped me with the tools and knowledge necessary to create a lasting impact in my community.

One of the highlights has been the brainstorming sessions with Ms. Anupama Muhuri, where I had the opportunity to collaborate, ideate, and develop tangible ways to give back to society. This experience has truly shaped my perspective on social responsibility.

One of my fondest memories was receiving a thoughtful gift package from CRY, which included a calendar and a mug.

I remember the excitement I felt when I unwrapped the package—it was a small but meaningful reminder of the community I had become a part of.

The calendar now sits proudly in my living room, and the mug has become my go-to for my daily dose of caffeine!

Did volunteering change something in you—how you think, feel, act?

It absolutely did. While I had always admired volunteers for their dedication, I never truly understood the effort and emotional commitment required until I experienced it firsthand. Volunteering has deepened my appreciation for the power of collective action and has made me more proactive in seeking ways to contribute to my community. It has changed not just how I think, but also how I act—reminding me that even small efforts can make a significant difference.

If you hadn't volunteered, what do you think you would have missed?

I would have missed the opportunity to give back in a meaningful way. High school students like myself may sometimes feel that we lack the resources to create real change, but volunteering proves that impact isn't about wealth or status—it's about time, effort, and intent. This experience has also reinforced the importance of instilling a culture of social responsibility, not just within myself but also in those around me. If I hadn't taken this step, I would have missed the chance to be part of something bigger than myself.

One thing you'd say to inspire someone to volunteer with CRY.

Many of us come from a place of privilege, and with privilege comes responsibility. It's not enough to simply acknowledge our advantages—we must actively use them to uplift those who lack access to basic opportunities. If this resonates with you, I strongly encourage you to explore volunteering with CRY. It's a chance to turn awareness into action, make a tangible impact, and embark on a journey that will not only change the lives of others but also enrich your own.

Why did you choose/decide to volunteer with CRY?

The first thing that came to mind was that I wanted to work with children. I was looking for online opportunities in Bengaluru that allowed active participation and interaction with children. So, when I did the search. I found information about CRY and thought, "Let's give this a chance." After attending the orientation and filling out the Google form to apply as a volunteer, I went on my first visit to the Yeshwantpur school. At first, I wasn't fully convinced, but I decided to stick around for six months and see how it goes. Over time, I made some good connections and met some great people, which motivated me to keep going. Apart from teaching, we were preparing kids for the skates and going for competitions, and when our kids won, it was a huge boost. The good company I found in this work kept me coming back on weekends.

What has this experience meant to you?

Volunteering with CRY has meant a lot to me. It provided a platform where I could interact with kids and make a meaningful impact on their future. Before working with schools, I also worked in the slums of Munekkulal. That experience was especially impactful. We were going door to door, conducting surveys, and bringing kids from their homes to participate in lessons. We didn't have proper classrooms; it was just in the field with slates and pencils, doing small activities. I felt a deep connection to those children, as they didn't have the security that children in schools have. Helping these kids get enrolled in school made me feel that I had truly impacted their lives. CRY gave me the platform to interact with them and influence them in ways that I couldn't have done alone. Being associated with a strong organization like CRY provided me with the background and resources to help these kids.

A special memory you associate with fondness/happiness stemming from the CRY experience

I have a lot of special memories with CRY, from the Dramebaaz project to the marathons and walkathons, but the most special one was working in Munekkulal. We had to talk to the parents, convince them to send their children to study. We promised them that we wouldn't give anything to their children except education, and we aimed to show them the potential their children had. We started everything from scratch, and that was a very special experience for me.

Did any fundamental change/shift happen to you due to volunteering with CRY?

Yes, volunteering with CRY has made me more extroverted because working with children requires you to take the first step in building connections. I have also become more compassionate and empathetic. Seeing the difficulties the kids face makes me more sensitive to their challenges, and I've become much more extroverted and empathetic toward social issues.

If you hadn't volunteered, what do you think you would have missed?

Absolutely, I would have missed a lot. First, my weekends would have been boring without listening to the stories of children. Secondly, I would have missed meeting the amazing volunteers at CRY. Everyone is unique, and I've learned a lot from them. I've also had the chance to bond with others and engage in activities, like exploring different parts of Bangalore and attending the Durga Puja pandal.

What is that one thing that you would say to someone to engage them with CRY as a volunteer?

Just do it—don't think twice. Give it a chance, and I promise you that the first moment working with CRY will motivate you, and you will not regret it.

Why did you choose/decide to volunteer with CRY?

CRY is one of the largest and most reputable organizations in India. This was particularly important to me because I wanted my internship work to have a meaningful impact, which is often more achievable on a larger scale. This preference reflects my personal choice, even though the contributions of smaller organizations are equally significant. However, to truly drive change and make a difference, you need strength and influence, which I believe CRY possesses. Additionally, I was drawn to CRY's specific focus on children and a strong emphasis on education. As someone who has been in school for the past sixteen years, I place a high value on education. The opportunity to assist other children in experiencing a similar journey and accessing the same opportunities I had was a major factor that attracted me to the organization.

What has volunteering with CRY meant to you?

I would say it meant broadening my horizons and stepping outside my comfort zone. Many people in my field of economics tend to follow similar career paths, becoming bankers or consultants. However, I wanted to explore other opportunities and discover how I could apply my skills and competencies. Working with CRY revealed to me that there are various paths in life; it's not a one-size-fitsall journey. I realized I could use my knowledge creatively to drive meaningful change, rather than merely focusing on numbers on a balance sheet or similar metrics.

A special memory you associate with happiness stemming from the CRY experience.

I find this question quite easy to answer because one experience I will never forget is visiting the partner schools myself. During those visits, witnessing the children, the schools, and the practical work that CRY is doing made everything clear—what it all represents and how it becomes a reality. I will always remember walking into a classroom and seeing the smiles on the kids' faces and their excitement and happiness. Of course, not every child is always joyful, but overall, witnessing their opportunity to be there demonstrates that the efforts of everyone at CRY are meaningful. You can see the tangible impact on the community, which I find incredibly powerful, and that experience will always stay with me.

If you hadn't volunteered, what do you think you would have missed?

I believe there are numerous aspects to consider, starting with the ability to view the world from a fresh perspective, which opens a new door to understanding and thinking about it. Equally important are the people I have met along the way. They hold as much significance as the work itself. When I enter a school and witness the practical application of your efforts, it is just as vital to observe how your colleagues and peers collaborate and influence their surroundings. The personal relationships formed while working together on meaningful projects create bonds that are essential to our lives. I mentioned earlier the importance of community, and it's crucial to recognize that it's not only about working within or for a community but also about valuing the community to which we belong. Specifically, I am referring to colleagues. If you don't enjoy the company of those you spend time with, what is the point? I would certainly have regretted not meeting those people with whom I can fondly reflect on spending five weeks, collaborating and learning together.

Did any fundamental change/shift happen to you due to volunteering with CRY?

I would like to revisit a point I made earlier. Nowadays, many individuals are focused on achieving personal success. People are pursuing their own unique success stories, and it seems that societies worldwide are becoming increasingly individualistic. Unfortunately, in doing so, we overlook the significance of community and the collective. My experience interning with CRY highlighted the importance of community and the value of standing together for others, rather than just for oneself. Working towards the benefit of someone else can be just as meaningful, if not more so, than pursuing personal gain. I believe this is a crucial insight.

What is that one thing that you would say to someone to engage them with CRY as a volunteer?

Like Nike's phrase "just do it", I would like to say to everyone "Just do it". I believe it's a fantastic opportunity for individuals of all ages to experience something fresh and unconventional. There's no reason not to take advantage of it. This is a fun and significant moment that can truly impact your life and the lives of others. So, take the leap!

Why did you choose/decide to volunteer with CRY?

I was at a juncture in my life where I wanted to give back but didn't know where to start. I knew I wanted to work with children because I believe that one good impact on at least one child can create a ripple effect that benefits both the child and society for generations to come. During my search for volunteering opportunities, I came across CRY. Their vision resonated deeply with me. When thinking about betterment for children, I always focused on improved living standards or educational infrastructure. But when I saw the word "dignity," my perspective shifted. The kind of impact CRY has made in the lives of thousands of children speaks for itself, and that's what drew me to them.

What has volunteering with CRY meant to you?

The contentment I've experienced through volunteering at CRY is unlike anything I've felt before. During my on-site experiences, I've had to, in the most beautiful way, put aside my "volunteer hat" and become a child again. I went there aiming to make an impact, but I quickly realized that I was working with children—blank canvases. I'm grateful to be able to fill at least one good line in their story, and if that stays with them into adulthood, I would consider myself lucky.

A special memory you associate with happiness stemming from the CRY experience.

I had the opportunity to visit the Women's Welfare Association in Hyderabad, where I conducted surveys and collected feedback on a previous session held by CRY. There, I met 15 young girls and women who had come from varied circumstances in life. This experience was eye-opening for me. Though I had an awareness of these issues, interacting with these girls and women face-to-face brought the reality to life. Despite all they had been through and the societal norms they were constrained by, they still had the ability to smile, laugh, jump, dance, and ask me to play games with them. It was humbling, and I felt like I was the one receiving support. When I left after about 3.5 hours, they came to me with tears in their eyes and said, "Why don't you come more often? We are so happy because you came here today," and they even gave me a rose they had made out of chart paper. This moment is forever etched in my heart, and I often think about going back to see them again.

Did any fundamental change/shift happen to you due to volunteering with CRY?

Yes, volunteering with CRY has truly shifted my perspective. Before, as an IT employee, I had the privilege to live freely—going to work late at night, wearing what I wanted, expressing my opinions, eating whatever I wished, and sometimes even complaining. I would occasionally see feminists fight for rights and think, "What else do we need? This is exactly what we wanted, and we have it all." However, after meeting these young girls and women at the Women's Welfare Association, my bubble burst. These girls, who had been through so much, were still full of life and joy. Their strength and resilience made me realize how much I took for granted. My perspective on social issues, especially those concerning women and children, has shifted significantly since volunteering with CRY.

If you hadn't volunteered, what do you think you would have missed?

I absolutely would have missed a lot. I would have missed meeting children at school, talking to them about Cyber Safety, and realizing how much smarter they are at their age compared to when I was young. I would have missed meeting the incredible girls I mentioned above, visiting the Microsoft campus, and delivering financial literacy sessions during the teachers' orientation. I would have also missed meeting my fellow volunteers—people from different backgrounds, yet with a shared desire to make a difference.

What is that one thing that you would say to someone to engage them with CRY as a volunteer?

Be open-minded, ready to take leadership, patient, and active. When an opportunity comes your way, and if your schedule permits, just go for it.

The impact you make might seem small to you, but it's a step toward something much bigger.

Why did you choose/decide to volunteer with CRY?

If you hadn't volunteered, what do you think you would have missed?

I would have been disconnected from the entire conversation, left wondering, "What did you say?" and feeling obligated to address the country's issues. A special memory you associate with fondness/happiness stemming from the CRY experience

This happened during my internship with the corporate partnership. I recall that we organized an employee engagement activity at one of the centers. We traveled about ten to fifteen kilometers from the office to a location where our team often volunteered. Upon arrival, we found a group of students eagerly waiting for us. They recognized some of our team members, including Subhashriman, and were visibly excited, jumping with joy. Over the course of two days, we conducted activities with them, and they poured so much love and happiness. It was a truly joyful experience and remains one of my fondest memories from my internship.

Did any fundamental change/shift happen to you due to volunteering with CRY?

My knowledge about the organization's work was quite limited. Most of what I knew came from online sources, and I may have only relayed that information.
